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














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
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"Real love happens only once in a lifetime"

In an exclusive conversation with OK! Pakistan, Kaifi talks about his music and his journey





orn and brought-up in Karachi, this distinct soulful voice hails from a family of Baloch musicians who call Lyari home. On the heels of a difficult childhood, the loss of his father and after years of uploading his music to YouTube, it was in 2022 that the 26-year old singer, song-writer and composer Kaifi Khalil first rose to fame as part of the ensemble behind Coke Studio's super-hit 'Kana Yaari' - a song he also wrote and composed. There has since been no looking back. With his chart topping 'Kahani Suno 2.0' that followed, Kaifi went on to become a household sensation with his widely acclaimed single topping the charts not only in Pakistan but also in India and Bangladesh.

How, in your view, did Kaifi Khalil become the person and the professional he is today?

KAIFI KHALIL: Never in my wildest dreams did I ever imagine I would become so well recognized or I would get the amount of love I am receiving today. I am beyond grateful to the Almighty for

bestowing me with so much success. Whatever I haven't been able to communicate in person, I have been able to convey through my melodies. I had this hunger inside me to verbalise my emotions in my melodies, in my tunes, and I was so focused on creating them that I never thought

how, when and where this God given gift would take me in future.

In your view has the super-hit 'Kahani Suno 2.0' changed your life?

KK: When I penned 'Kahani Suno', I wasn't entirely sure if audiences would relate to the lyrics. As part of an emotionally detached and

somewhat desensitised society, people poke fun at anyone who openly dares to talk about love and loss, which is not very often. I was therefore initially afraid to verbalise my emotions, to pour out my heart, but something inside me told me to just do it as there are others who can relate to these emotions, to these sentiments. There are countless others who, like me, wanted to pour out their hearts but just couldn't, and that just changed everything.

Were you expecting the song to become the international rage it did?

KK: For me personally, with regard to music, fame and popularity aren't considerations. However, I do always try to stay positive and even if a few people appreciate my work, I am content and thankful. Audiences have played a huge part in the unprecedented success of 'Kahani Suno' both at home and abroad.

In your view, can you only fall in love once?

KK: People can fall in love more than once, but

real love happens only once in a lifetime.

What is your next melody about - another ballad or something different?

KK: For me, my upcoming song is a deconstructed narration of what happened in 'Kahani' and who played what character in that story. I feel once the song is released it will be easier to understand. For the moment, it would be safe to say my upcoming single is Kahani's kahani.

For artists, do you believe life's trajectories are responsible for the tunes, melodies and music vou create?

KK: Yes! Individuals and artists alike better understand the complexities of life after going through the most strenuous and demanding journeys. Hard times are teaching experiences which enable and equip us to navigate our lives, and as artists tell us how to keep our art alive. It's the work of an artist to be an empath first and tough times make to create such realisations.

Who is your favourite artist/musician and why?

KK: Every artist in their own capacity and genre of expertise is doing great work. Like each individual, all artists have their own story and their own individual and personalised projection of it. As artists, with regard to our music, we each play the character of our own stories - some of us singing in pain, others in bliss, and some in indifference, all different aspects of different stories.

What powers and drives your creative sensibilities?

KK: I am still learning, and I don't want this desire to learn to ever end. I want to keep writing songs and composing music that audiences can relate to – this so I can become a part of their life and their journey.

Who is your support system?

KK: My family. I have always been extremely close to both of my parents. Even after my father's demise I feel close to him – even today, he continues to watch over me and guide my way. I hope that is forever the case.

What, in your view, is the key to success in today's world?

KK: In today's world, education is the key. However, I do believe education alone is not enough sans compassion. I am a firm believer that each individual has to make an effort to be a better human by constantly scrutinising one's own behaviour and actions towards others. And it is this self-examining trait with the love for others in one's heart that actually makes someone human. 🐹

The actor's first novel, "The Making of Another Major Motion Picture Masterpiece" offers an insider's look at the film industry



hen you've accomplished as much as Tom Hanks has over the course of an illustrious acting career, you can be forgiven if you want to try your hand in another medium. His new book draws on his own on-set experiences

dealing with egotistical directors, eccentric writers, tantrums, and the usual kinds of creative differences that can wreak havoc on a film production, Hanks makes a solid, if cautious, debut as an author.

"I've made enough movies that I've collected so many stories that literally begin with 'How did you get started? What was your first job?' — and out of that comes all of humanity," Hanks says.

"Masterpiece" is technically Hanks' second book. He previously wrote "Uncommon Type," published by Knopf in 2017, a collection of 17 short stories whose common thread is the presence of a manual typewriter. But cranking out a novel proved to be a much more daunting task.

"It's easy to write a novel, you just have to put in the time and the blood. But writing a novel that everyone wants to read, that's another story."

The 66-year-old Hanks was last seen starring in the comedy-drama *A Man Called Otto* earlier this year. He currently has five new projects in the pipeline including *Here*, directed by Robert Zemeckis and costarring Robin Wright, Kelly Reilly (Yellowstone), Paul Bettany, and Michele Dockery. He's also producing *Masters of the Air*, a WWII drama starring Austin Butler as a fighter pilot commanding one of the Flying Fortress aircraft that flew numerous sorties over Germany. In addition, Hanks is co-producing *My Big Fat Greek Wedding 3* together with his wife Rita Wilson.

Masterpiece" is now available via Amazon and via UK booksellers.

What do you think is the biggest public misconception about how a movie gets made?

TOM HANKS: Most people think that a movie reels out like a Broadway play does or a performance of an opera. In those cases everybody knows exactly what they are, where they need to be, how they need to do it. But movies are a long series of accidents that you don't expect, as well as, occasionally, something that goes off exactly as you planned. It's all things all at the same time.

Have you seen a lot of chaos on a film set?

TH: I've been pretty lucky to have worked with a lot of great directors and producers who have run a tight ship and not let things get out of control. But sometimes there are going to be eruptions of what are politely known as "creative differences" – where you get into arguments over particular scenes that are just not working out.

Usually it happens when the script is not really locked before you begin shooting and that leads to problems. But like I said, I've been pretty lucky to work with talented people and I've managed to avoid the kinds of nightmare projects that some people have had to suffer through.

The protagonist of your novel is a nasty and selfish hero working on a big-budget superhero movie. Have you witnessed a lot of incidents and the kind of bad behaviour that you describe that that character displays in the book?

TH: I've behaved like that myself on occasion, I didn't need to think about other people or invent moments where you're rude and inconsiderate of other people. But you're going to have days like that when, for

whatever reason, there are things weighing on you in your life and you can't live up to the image of being polite and funny all the time. Not that I mind that people expect that from me because that's what I aspire to.

What's the hardest time you've ever had while making a movie?

TH: The hardest work I've ever done as an actor, or a human being, has been recording Woody (in the *Toy Story* film). When you're working as a voice actor and sitting in a sound booth, you're asked to keep repeating the same line over and over again to create different cadences and different rhythms that give the director as many options as possible.

Sometimes I've had to repeat the same line 80 times which is not that much fun by the time you get to number 67 or so. (Hanks then launches into the voice of Woody and delivers multiple versions of the phrase, "Ah, for crying out loud, Buzz. Get back in the box.")

You're one of the most beloved actors in the business and you've starred in some of the best movies that have been made in the last 40 years. Do you have any favourites that you like to watch?

TH: No. I have no patience and I keep thinking of things I could have done differently. So that drives me crazy, and you'll find a lot of actors who can't stand watching their own movies. But if someone forced me to watch one of them, I would probably pick *That Thing You Do* because I was able to work with my kids and a lot of my friends on that. Also, I still have vivid memories of my son Truman being born in between two scenes that we shot on that movie.

What do you think is one of the main qualities about you that has helped endear you to ►

audiences?

TH: (Laughs) Not that I want to gush over myself, but I think I bring a sense of quiet hopefulness to most of the characters I play. I hate cynicism, which I think is one of the worst things that has begun to take hold of our society.

I'm not an optimist, but I'm definitely not a cynic. Cynicism seems to be the default setting in modern culture...and that just makes everything so much harder and just adds to our malaise.

It doesn't help in any way to bring that kind of attitude to life because it's so easy to think the worst, expect the worst, and don't get out and change things and try to do better.

I believe 73 percent of humans want to do the right thing. The rest screw it up.

What was your inspiration to take a stab at writing your first novel?

TH: It was Nora Ephron. I loved working with her, and she was just so smart and funny and interesting to be with. She was really the inspiration for me and I mention how much I owe to her in the acknowledgements in my book. I still think about her every day. She was a wonderful person and I think everyone who got to know her misses her.

You grew up in a family that was constantly moving around a lot. Did that ever adversely affect you?

TH: You know something, that kind of thing sometimes can have a bad effect on children to keep having to pack up your stuff and settle into a new place. That's especially true when kids feel anxious and insecure about having to go to new schools and having to make new friends and fit in.

But I never had that experience. I was usually excited about moving to a new apartment and also making new friends.

What was your home life like?

TH: I was on my own a lot. My parents were divorced and my dad was not married for the better part of two and a half years. So me and my older brother and older sister, we were these feral latchkey kids. But we didn't get into trouble. We were not delinquents or anything like that.

But essentially Dad (who worked as a chef) would say, "There's some frozen steaks and a can of tomato soup, and that's your dinner." Then we wouldn't see him because he was working at the Castaway restaurant in Jack London Square.

Sometimes that could get a little lonely and that's why I think I started using humour as a way of connecting to other people. But I have pretty good memories of growing up.

Do you love your job more when you get to play great real-life figures like Sully or Jim Lovell (in *Apollo 13*) or characters who are just as uplifting?

TH: I'm very lucky because I feel that every film is a new adventure and a new experience. It's great to be able to keep doing something that you love to do and



have that kind of creative satisfaction. It never gets boring.

For me, the true measure of success is artistic longevity. I don't like to look back on my past work because there's nothing I can do to change that and the only thing that really matters is what kinds of work you're doing now and in the future. I try to stick to the path that's taken me this far — I hope it keeps working for me.

You and your wife Rita Wilson have raised two children together. Has it been hard to keep your status as a movie star separate from your home life?

TH: We're not the kind of family where we have posters of our films on the walls of the house. But having said that, my wife knew she was marrying an actor and not a dentist. And my children learned from a young age that their dad had a funny job.

They always knew that I was working on a film because my haircut would be different or I've had to grow a moustache. But this is the kind of job that gives us the opportunity to spend free holidays in Budapest or Morocco. But I think the best way that I've been able to have a good and balanced home life is to have eaten breakfast together.


You seem to have a sense of dignity that you're able to channel into characters who ultimately embrace the best elements in human nature?

TH: I've always had the feeling that you have to be respectful and aware that other people have it tough, and maybe much tougher than you, so it keeps you from becoming arrogant with whatever success you have in life. You're still very aware of how lucky you've had it, and that other people have to struggle. I still remain guardedly optimistic about life.

ZOYANASIR

The Pakistani actress discusses getting into character, challenges she's faced, her toughest role to date, and so much more...



oya Nasir is a Pakistani actress who has been exposed to the world of acting since she was a young child. At the age of five she could be seen performing dance moves and acting out scenes on the side while cameras were rolling on set. It really is no surprise that acting is Zoya Nasir's true calling. In an interview with *OK*! Pakistan, the actress shares her favourite role to-date along with the most challenging one, how she gets into character, the kind of scripts she's most attracted to and so much more...

Who would you say Zoya Nasir is?

Zoya Nasir: I'm learning life as I go, wanting happiness around me with a gentle ambition. So basically self-content is Zoya Nasir personified.

Who inspired you to take up acting?

ZN: I grew up on sets. The golden era of Lollywood, if you would, as my dad is a screenwriter. Ever since I've seen the camera roll I knew I wanted to be an actor. I would hold dupattas and sing along the songs or act out scenes from an age as young as five

What do you feel is your biggest achievement?

ZN: My biggest achievement is yet to be achieved but to this date I think it's our family's combined effort to meet once every year. We are spread around the entire country with my four elder siblings with a total of 11 children. Doesn't make it easy. It's priceless. I've scene siblings drift apart and we haven't. That's an achievement Alhamdulillah.

Which role was your favourite - Annie from Badzaat Or Sameen from Mere Humsafar? Why?

ZN: Both are very different from each other to be compared. Every role I do is my favourite as I put my heart and soul into it. But I was surprised at the feedback I got as Sameen. It was a tough role to perform. Unlike Annie's loud character, Sameen was monotonous, serious and simple. I hadn't done it in a long time so found it really challenging and when people loved it, I felt exhilarated. However, I'm proud to okay Annie as well. Playing such a high maintenance role isn't a peace of cake either.

What is your greatest strength and weakness?

ZN: Trusting anyone too easily is my greatest weakness. My family is my greatest strength, especially my parents and my eldest brother. I can't imagine a world where I exist without them.

What type of scripts attract you the most?

ZN: Strong substantial roles or comedy. None of that damsel in distress.

What are the steps you take to tap into one of the characters on screen?

ZN: To step into the character, first of all, I read the script two or three times because I really need to understand it. I need to justify the character's actions and what they say because most of the time I'll be reading a line and be like, "this is not how I would respond". So I need to tell myself that it's not me. It's the character that's responding, not me as myself. So basically that character's

personality is different to mine. In order to become the character, you really have to understand the personality tangent of that character and act accordingly to justify all of their moves and all of their actions and thought processes. Some are serious, some are territorial, some are spoiled, some are ambitious, some are territorial and some are kind of negative because they are threatened. So all these characters are different personalities. That's how you become the character. It changes your body languages. It changes your style of talking. That's what it is. The character is a whole living person with a different personality, not yours, but somebody else's.

Did you face any challenges in this field? And how did you overcome them?

ZN: The only challenge I faced was the challenge of becoming the character. I really had to learn the difference between becoming the character and just practicing lines. It made me a better actor.


If you had the opportunity to work with any actor of your choice, who would it be and why?

ZN: I would love to work with Junaid Khan again. He's so easy going, he doesn't give anyone a tough time, he's funny and he can do any role to perfection.

Any plans of coming on the big screen?

ZN: So far, none. However, if I stumble upon something great then why not?

Do you think it's an artist's responsibility to





speak about matters that might be of public interest - politics, current affairs, human rights, etc. ? If so, why?

ZN: The artist should speak up because we are the face of the nation in a way. As an artist you tend to have an influence over people including your fans, especially with Instagram, Twitter and Facebook. Those people listen to you blindly. However, before giving your opinion or raising awareness, I think an artist should be well aware of the matter - be it human rights, animal rights, or political views.

At a very young age you have gained a lot of success. Do you think that has changed you?

ZN: Thank you so much for acknowledging my success and of course it has changed me. It has humbled me. It has "unspoiled" me because now I know the real world, the good and the bad that comes with it, and how when you really want something it's that much harder to get.

How do you balance your personal and work life?

ZN: It's really hard but I try. If I end up doing two plays at a time then I literally have no life. The working hours are tiresome and then you have to be prepared for the next day. It sucks all the energy for anything else to do. I've missed major events, like my siblings' birthdays, or my neices' sports day, family reunions and weddings. That being said, sometimes I'll be free at a stretch for upto two months and I always make sure to make up for it so that's my own way of keeping the balance.

The entertainment industry is said to be full of stress and pressure. What do you do to tackle the pressure that comes with your work?

ZN: I think all professions comes with their own challenges and I'm not the best at working under pressure or in a toxic working environment even though I'm a hard worker. When things get too much for me to handle on my own, I turn to my mother or my brother and they guide me through.

Describe your most challenging role to date.

ZN: The most challenging role for me was Sameen because she was very well-balanced and it was hard for me because it could have come across like I wasn't acting at all or she could have have appeared to be very boring with a lack of personality. I think when you're doing negative characters or playing the role of a damsel in distress, or even comedy, it's a lot easier so Sameen's well-balanced role was very challenging for me compared to all my other roles. It was a very well-written role but one that was hard for me to do.

Who do you consider to be your role model? Whose career you would like to emulate, and why?

ZN: I don't have just one role model. I have loads of them and it would be a long list. Also, I wouldn't want to emulate anyone else's career. I would want to carve my own path and make a name for my own self.

What has been your favourite role to date, and why?

ZN: Narmeen in *Dobara*. Even though I had very little screen time, the contrast in the beginning compared to when I re-enter was written and directed to perfection. It was a joy to work with Danish Nawaz, all the actors and the entire crew everything about it was great.



Describe your acting style.

ZN: I want to say I can be theatrical, dramatic and organic, and purely Zoya Nasir. I don't imitate or take inspiration from anyone when it comes to acting. I just channel the character that I make up in my head.

What are you passionate about?

ZN: Acting, my salon, my place, my family and my friends.

Who is your celebrity crush?

ZN: Fawad Khan.

What's your biggest pet peeve?

ZN: When people spell my name with an "x". It's Zoya not Xoya.

Favourite perfume?

ZN: Trésor Midnight Rose by Lancôme. Sadly it's been discontinued and I'm down to my last bottle.

Go-to label?

ZN: In Pakistan it's Lama, Outfitters, Limelight, Khaadi or whatever wonderful things my mom gets me to wear because she knows what I like.

Coffee or tea?

ZN: None. I've lost my tolerance for caffeine. One cup of chai starts giving me palpitations.

If you weren't in this industry, what would you be doing right now?

ZN: I would be a beautician and a salon owner, which is what I've actually been doing since before I became famous or started my career in acting.

What's the most interesting thing you've read or seen this week?

ZN: I was sent an article by a friend according to which I have left behind two kids in the United Kingdom. It's definitely not true. Other than that, I'm re-reading my favourite book, *Digital Fortress* by Dan Brown, for the fourth time.

How would you like to be remembered?

ZN: I'm not sure at the moment. I'm discovering myself as I go. But I would like to be remembered in good light.

KARL LAGERFELD: A CELEBRATION OF A FASHION LEGEND



As The Metropolitan Museum Of Art honours the late creative director of Chanel, OK! looks back at the icon's incredible carrer



ashion's biggest night out, The Met Gala, returned for another year this week and the eagerly anticipated event in New York certainly caused a buzz in the fashion industry. As well as the intense speculation about which A-listers would (or would not) be in attendance, the theme of the night, Karl Lagerfeld: A Line Of Beauty, was also on people's lips.

The gala honoured the artistic brilliance of the late German designer who was at the head of some of the world's biggest fashion houses, including Chanel, Fendi and his own namesake label, when he died in 2019, aged 85. He was also rumoured to have left some of his £153 million fortune to his beloved cat Choupette, who was, of course, formally invited to this year's Met Gala as a VIP guest.

Paying further homage to Lagerfeld, The Metropolitan Museum Of Art announced that The Costume Institute's spring exhibition, open to the public from 5 May until 16 July, will highlight the genius behind his complex creative process. The show – also called Karl Lagerfeld: A Line Of Beauty – will display more than 150 original garments accompanied by some of his famous fashion sketches from his early career in the 1950s to his final collection for Chanel back in 2019.

But who exactly was the man with the signature white ponytail, black fan, black sunglasses and fingerless leather gloves, whose most beloved companion was his blue-eyed cat? We take a look at some of his most iconic fashion moments, and

most celebrated career highlights...

HIS DISTINCTIVE DRESS CODE

This severe monochromatic outfit became the designer's trademark look. He was rarely seen out of his uniform — the black tailoring, stiff white shirt collars buttoned to the neck, fingerless leather gloves and blacked-out sunglasses became iconic in their own right.

Lagerfeld even went on a drastic diet he called "sort of punishment" to fit into his signature style later on in his career. His regime,

the Spoonlight Program, was sold to the public with a 2005 book titled The Karl Lagerfeld Diet.

THE ICONIC FASHION SKETCH

Some of the designer's stunning original fashion sketches will be on display in the Karl Lagerfeld: A Line

Of Beauty exhibition in New York's Met Museum. Sketching was said to be both his primary method of creative expression and his primary method of communication.

Throughout his career, the Hamburgborn creative



refined his unique style of sketching and that artistry is explored further in the exhibition. The show explains how the serpentine line (an S-shaped curved line) he used in his drawings demonstrates Lagerfeld's love of history, romance and decoration, while the straight line indicates •



his more modernist and minimalist tastes.

The designer's sketches are now so sought after that since his passing some have been auctioned at Sotheby's in Paris and sold for almost triple their estimated value.

HIS EARLY CAREER

In 1954, Lagerfeld embarked on a career in fashion. At an International Wool Association competition in Paris, he won first place in the coat category – this led to his first job working as an assistant to Pierre Balmain. Later, in 1957,

Jean Patou hired Lagerfeld as his art director – earning him his first major fashion role.


In 1964, following a freelance stint at Valentino, he began working with Chloé, taking a leading role in 1966. It was here that he launched his first perfume.

In 1965, he began a longstanding relationship with Fendi as head ready-towear designer. He produced more than 100 collections during a 54-year span.

REVIVING CHANEL

One of the most pivotal points in Lagerfeld's career – and arguably within the history of fashion – was when he became the chief artistic director at Chanel in 1983, a position he held until his death. His singular vision helped to turn the tired French fashion label – once at the cutting edge of Parisian style – into the global powerhouse we know today.

He revived the house's fortunes with his modern reinvention of the iconic Chanel tweed suit,







Karl Lagerfeld carried a fan as an accessory... In 2010, Welsh fashion designer Julien Macdonald spoke of his time working for Lagerfeld. "He used to carry around a black fan and when you were being difficult he'd hit you with it," revealed Julien. "It was all done in a joking way and never done very hard, but I do remember it quite clearly."

THE MUSES

Lagerfeld also became known for his array of beautiful muses, which included the hottest models of the moment. He had a strong affinity with his fellow German style icon, supermodel Claudia Schiffer, and even cast her as his Chanel couture "bride" an unprecedented 11 times.

It's hard to find a supermodel who walked hasn't for the designer. Kate Moss, Naomi Campbell and Linda Evangelista were all regulars on the catwalk for him in the 90s. A more recent muse was Cara Delevingne, who met Lagerfeld at her first Chanel show when she

was 20. He was said to have greatly influenced her as the pair forged a close bond.

MET GALA STYLE

Lagerfeld's creations have graced many Met Gala red carpets over the years. Here, he is pictured with actress Blake Lively, who channelled her inner Greek goddess in a Chanel haute couture gown at the event back in 2011. This gala was held in honour of the Alexander McQueen: Savage Beauty exhibition.

A LASTING FRIENDSHIP

Fashion's most glamorous BFFs? Dame Anna Wintour and Lagerfeld struck up a wellreported friendship during his career and they were regularly spotted together at glitzy events. The editor-inchief and artistic director of Condé Nast paid tribute to him in the run-up to this year's Met Gala calling him "my brilliant friend" and the "living soul of fashion".

Tennis fan Anna recalls the time the designer gave her the ultimate gift, going as far building a court on his Biarritz property as a ploy to get her to stay over as a guest. "Karl was trying to give me somewhere I could feel at home, where I could be myself," she said.

THE SHOW MUST GO ON - LAGERFELD'S FINAL CATWALK

Shortly after Lagerfeld's death, models walked the Chanel A/W 2019 catwalk showcasing an exquisite Alpine-themed collection. The epitome of winter chic, the runway was surrounded by a village of chalets.

Although this was the moment the fashion world bid farewell to the designer, the pictureperfect scene was intended to be celebratory rather than mournful – something Lagerfeld was keen to avoid. He did not want a formal funeral service and instead requested his ashes be placed with his late mother. Famous friends paid tribute to him, and models could be seen in tears on the catwalk. Chanel's message was clear – he may be gone, but his legacy certainly lives on.

orn and raised in Lahore, model turned actor Kiran Malik moved to Dubai where she began her professional career as an HR Consultant before delving into modelling and going on to become the face of many leading brands and designers. Kiran's first film to go on set was the Jehan Films' spy-action thriller Zarrar, the delayed release of which in 2022 made for Kiran's her on-screen debut in 2018 essaying the role of Mehr Chughtai in Pinky Memsaab directed by Shazia Ali Khan. 2023 saw the release of Kiran's third film, Faisal Qureshi's crime-comedy Money Back Guarantee with a large ensemble cast including the likes of Fawad Khan and Wasim Akram. As an actor, for Kiran this is only just the beginning.

Having begun your career as a model, what made you transition from ramp to screen, and how are you a different person today from when it all began?

KIRAN MALIK: Life is a journey, one that keeps presenting you with different opportunities and challenges. My on-screen career began purely by luck and a chance encounter – a run-in with actor Shaan Shahid at a cafe that got me my first role. This by sheer coincidence, just around the time I was consciously planning on winding down my on-ramp career. Though I still do the occasional still shoots especially for my persuasive designer

friends and well-wishers. At the end of it all, any career should be about unlocking new challenges as this is the best and only way to grow.

What, for you, defines style?

KM: As Diane Von Furstenberg says, "Confidence. If you have it, you can make anything look good." For me, style is how confidently you express yourself to the world.

KM: Even though it may sound corny, I would love to do a Wonder Woman type role directed by our very own Sharmeen Obaid-Chinoy.

SCENT TO SHARE

THE UNISEX TREND IS CREATING THE ULTIMATE IN PLEASE-ALL PERFUMES, SAYS BEAUTY EDITOR LYNNE HYLAND

his won't be a socio-political essay, don't worry, but I think we can all agree that gender identity is blurred like never before. And what's happening in the wider world is very much being echoed in the perfume halls. Unisex fragrance is booming, with the beauty world encouraging us to love what we love, instead of being confined to "male" and "female" scents.

If you stop to think about it, the whole concept of assigning a gender to certain fragrance notes is bizarre. Who decided that berries and flowers were female, while smoky spice and musk were male, for instance? Advertisers, that's who.

"Historically all fragrances were all unisex," explains Lorna McKay from The Perfume Society. "It was marketing at the turn of the 20th century that changed the landscape, when perfumers blended perfumes rather than just using single flower essences. The arrival of synthetics – not a bad word in perfumery – gave rise to the creations we enjoy today."

From a perfumer's point of view, creating a "unisex" scent today means toning down the stereotypes at either end of the spectrum. "Sweet, foodie notes, and tobacco, leathery notes tend to be dialled down," says Lorna.

"Less polarising notes – citrus, classic floral, aquatic and green notes, for instance – come to the fore. Wanting to smell and feel good is more important than wanting to identify a certain way."

Personally, I'm all for it. It's rare to find a unisex fragrance I don't enjoy, perhaps because this category, by its very nature, sets out to be an all-round crowd-pleaser. Even my perfume-phobic husband likes them too, which makes a change from the usual hand wafts, mock-choking and yelps of "what is that?" when I'm testing most "female" scents.

The only downside is, they might not last as long when they're so wearable and shareable.

Here are six I'll need to watch the liquid level on very closely...

GREAT ESCAPE

Maison Crivelli Neroli
Nasimba EDP, PKR 31,400
The call of the wild, turned into a unisex spritz. It's inspired by a luxurious safari retreat, starting with zesty orange as the early morning wake-up call, then moving on to a walk of discovery where orange blossom flourishes in the savannah.
All dangerous wildlife is kept at a safe distance – the subtle base leather note


FOR A SLOWER PACE: CAT ISLAND

WHERE TO STAY: Red Knot Manor is a humble guesthouse with home-cooked meals available on request.


DON'T MISS: The After Work Bar – a place where locals gather for a beer over a game of dominoes and a chat is a good spot to taste the Inagua way of life.



Any travel tips you would like to share?


RK: Try and take a flight with minimum hours of transit. Research well about the place you go to and especially look into their local apps for commuting and ordering food. That comes very very handy!






